(57) ABSTRACT

A new and distinct cultivar of *Calibrachoa* plant named 'Duealrow', characterized by its compact, semi-upright and outwardly spreading to trailing and decumbent plant habit; freely branching habit; early and freely flowering habit; large white-colored flowers with red purple colored centers; and good garden performance.

BACKGROUND OF THE INVENTION

The present invention relates to a new and distinct cultivar of *Calibrachoa* plant, botanically known as *Calibrachoa* sp. and hereinafter referred to by the name 'Duealrow'.

The new *Calibrachoa* plant is a product of a planned breeding program conducted by the Inventor in Rheinberg, Germany. The objective of the breeding program is to create new compact *Calibrachoa* plants with large attractive flowers.

The new *Calibrachoa* plant originated from a cross-pollination made by the Inventor in July, 2011 in Rheinberg, Germany of a proprietary selection of *Calibrachoa* sp. identified as code number A10-5560-004, not patented, as the female, or seed, parent with a proprietary selection of *Calibrachoa* sp. identified as code number A10-7554-001, not patented, as the male, or pollen, parent. The new *Calibrachoa* plant was discovered and selected by the Inventor as a single flowering plant from within the progeny of the stated cross-pollination in a controlled greenhouse environment in Rheinberg, Germany in May, 2013.

Asexual reproduction of the new *Calibrachoa* plant by vegetative terminal cuttings in a controlled greenhouse environment in Rheinberg, Germany since June, 2013 has shown that the unique features of this new *Calibrachoa* plant are stable and reproduced true to type in successive generations.

SUMMARY OF THE INVENTION

Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* have not been observed under all possible combinations of environmental conditions and cultural practices. The phenotype may vary somewhat with variations in environmental conditions such as temperature and light intensity without, however, any variance in genotype.

The following traits have been repeatedly observed and are determined to be the unique characteristics of 'Duealrow'.

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These characteristics in combination distinguish 'Duealrow' as a new and distinct *Calibrachoa* plant:

- 1. Compact, semi-upright and outwardly spreading to trailing and decumbent plant habit.
- 2. Freely branching habit.
- 3. Early and freely flowering habit.
- 4. Large white-colored flowers with red purple-colored centers.
- 5. Good garden performance.

The new *Calibrachoa* can be compared to plants of the female parent selection. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* differ primarily from plants of the female parent selection in growth habit as plants of the new *Calibrachoa* are more vigorous than plants of the female parent selection. In addition, plants of the new *Calibrachoa* flower earlier than plants of the female parent selection.

The new *Calibrachoa* can be compared to plants of the male parent selection. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* differ primarily from plants of the male parent selection in branching habit as plants of the new *Calibrachoa* are more freely branching than plants of the male parent selection. In addition, plants of the new *Calibrachoa* have smaller flowers than plants of the male parent selection.

Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* can be compared to plants of *Calibrachoa* sp. 'Cal White', disclosed in U.S. Plant Pat. No. 14,497. In side-by-side comparisons, plants of the new *Calibrachoa* differed primarily from plants of 'Cal White' in the following characteristics:

- 1. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* were larger and more vigorous than plants of 'Cal White'.
- 2. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* were more freely branching than plants of 'Cal White'.
- 3. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* had thicker stems than plants of 'Cal White'.
- 4. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* had broader leaves than plants of 'Cal White'.

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5. Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* had larger flowers than plants of 'Cal White'.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PHOTOGRAPH

The accompanying colored photograph illustrates the overall appearance of the new *Calibrachoa* plant showing the colors as true as it is reasonably possible to obtain in colored reproductions of this type. Colors in the photograph may differ slightly from the color values cited in the detailed 10 botanical description which accurately describe the colors of the new *Calibrachoa* plant.

The photograph is a close-up view of typical flowers and leaves of 'Duealrow'.

DETAILED BOTANICAL DESCRIPTION

The aforementioned photograph and following observations, measurements and values describe plants grown during the summer in 30-cm containers in a glass-covered greenhouse in Rheinberg, Germany and under cultural practices typical of commercial *Calibrachoa* production. During the production of the plants, day and night temperatures averaged 18° C. and light levels averaged 4,500 lux. Rooted young plants were pinched one time three weeks after planting and were 13 weeks old when the photograph and description were taken. In the following description, color references are made to The Royal Horticultural Society Colour Chart, 2007 Edition, except where general terms of ordinary dictionary significance are used.

Botanical classification: *Calibrachoa* sp. 'Duealrow'. Parentage:

Female, or seed, parent.—Proprietary selection of Calibrachoa sp. identified as code number A10-5560-004, not patented.

Male, or pollen, parent.—Proprietary selection of Calibrachoa sp. identified as code number A10-7554-001, not patented.

Propagation:

Type.—By vegetative cuttings.

Time to initiate roots, summer.—About five days at temperatures about 20° C.

Time to initiate roots, winter.—About seven days at temperatures about 20° C.

Time to produce a rooted young plant, summer.—About 45 three weeks at temperatures about 20° C.

Time to produce a rooted young plant, winter.—About four weeks at temperatures about 20° C.

Root description.—Fine, fibrous; white in color.

Rooting habit.—Freely branching; dense.

Plant description:

Plant and growth habit.—Compact, semi-upright and outwardly spreading to trailing and decumbent plant habit; freely branching habit with about twelve primary lateral branches developing per plant; pinching enhances branching; vigorous growth habit; moderate growth rate.

Plant height.—About 27 cm.

Plant diameter.—About 73 cm.

Lateral branch description:

Length.—About 32 cm.

Diameter.—About 3 mm.

Internode length.—About 2.1 cm.

Strength.—Strong.

Aspect.—Initially upright to outwardly spreading to 65 trailing and decumbent.

Texture.—Pubescent.

Color.—Close to 144B.

Leaf description:

Arrangement.—Alternate, simple.

Length.—About 2.2 cm.

Width.—About 1 cm.

Shape.—Oblanceolate.

Apex.—Rounded.

Base.—Cuneate.

Margin.—Entire.

Texture, upper and lower surfaces.—Pubescent.

Venation pattern.—Pinnate; arcuate.

Color.—Developing leaves, upper surface: Close to 144A. Developing leaves, lower surface: Close to 147B. Fully expanded leaves, upper surface: Close to 137B; venation, close to 146B. Fully expanded leaves, lower surface: Close to 137C; venation, close to 146C.

Petioles.—Length: About 1 mm. Diameter: About 1.3 mm. Texture, upper and lower surfaces: Pubescent. Color, upper surface: Close to 143B. Color, lower surface: Close to 143C.

Flower description:

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Flower arrangement and habit.—Single salverform flowers arising from leaf axils; freely flowering habit with usually about 100 to 120 flowers developing per plant; flowers face upright or outwardly.

Fragrance.—None detected.

Natural flowering season.—Early flowering habit, plants of the new Calibrachoa initiate and develop flowers about four to five weeks after planting; plants flower continuously from the spring throughout the summer in Germany.

Flower longevity.—Individual flowers last about seven to ten days on the plant; flowers not persistent.

Flower diameter.—About 3 cm.

Flower length (height).—About 3 cm.

Flower throat diameter.—About 7.2 mm.

Flower tube length.—About 1.7 cm.

Flower tube diameter, base.—About 1.9 mm.

Flower buds.—Length: About 2.2 cm. Diameter: About 4.6 mm. Shape: Elongated oblong. Color: Close to 158B.

Corolla.—Arrangement: Five petals fused at the base and opening into a flared trumpet. Petal length from throat: About 1.5 cm. Petal lobe width: About 1.6 cm. Petal shape: Roughly spatulate. Petal apex: Mostly rounded to slightly retuse. Petal margin: Entire. Petal texture, upper and lower surfaces: Smooth, glabrous. Throat texture: Smooth, glabrous. Tube texture: Smooth, glabrous. Color: Petal, when opening, upper surface: Close to N155D. Petal, when opening, lower surface: Close to N155B. Petal, fully opened, upper surface: Close to N155B; towards the base, close to 57A; venation, close to N81B; color becoming closer to N155C with development. Petal, fully opened, lower surface: Close to N155D; venation, close to 53A. Throat: Close to 153B; venation, close to N81B. Tube: Close to 153B; venation, close to N81B.

Calyx.—Arrangement: Star-shaped calyx with five sepals; sepals fused at the base. Sepal length: About 1.3 cm. Sepal width: About 2.2 mm. Sepal shape: Lanceolate. Sepal apex: Acute. Sepal margin: Entire. Sepal texture, upper and lower surfaces: Pubescent. Color, upper and lower surfaces: Close to 146B.

Peduncles.—Length: About 1 cm. Diameter: About 1 mm. Angle: About 45° from stem axis. Strength: Moderately strong. Texture: Pubescent. Color: Close to 143C.

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Reproductive organs:

Stamens.—Quantity: Six per flower. Filament length: About 5.8 mm. Filament color: Close to 149D. Anther shape: Ellipsoidal. Anther length: About 0.5 mm. Anther color: Close to 2B. Pollen amount: Scarce. Pollen color: Close to 3A.

Pistils.—Quantity: One per flower. Pistil length: About 7.6 mm. Style length: About 6.6 mm. Style color: Close to 143C. Stigma shape: Ellipsoidal. Stigma color: Close to 144A. Ovary color: Close to 144B.

Seeds and fruits.—Seed and fruit development have not been observed on plants of the new Calibrachoa.

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Garden performance: Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* have been observed to have good garden performance and tolerate wind, rain and temperatures ranging from about 5° C. to about 40° C.

Pathogen & pest resistance: Plants of the new *Calibrachoa* have not been observed to be resistant to pathogens and pests common to *Calibrachoa* plants.

It is claimed:

1. A new and distinct *Calibrachoa* plant named 'Duealrow' as illustrated and described.

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
